...a quick study of God's edifying Word by R.J. Baker. Discover the truth and promises intended for every believer.

"THE PROMISE...THE RETURN"

(Revised and expanded previous lesson)

Study Verses: Mark 13: 24-37; John 11: 16; 14:5; 20: 25-29; Acts 1: 13

Several disciples have questions. At this time none of the disciples are able to grasp the depth of their Lord's message as He approaches His destiny of fulfilling prophesy. Mark's thirteenth chapter provides answers and careful explanations of Jesus' purpose and promised return as the Christ.

The disciples are beginning to genuinely believe who their Master is, and what He alone can accomplish in God's plan of salvation. It is far removed from overcoming Rome's political and military oppression of the Jewish people. Most suffering Jews have long awaited a David-type Messiah to restore Jerusalem to power, prosperity and glory. The Son of God boldly speaks to His brutal captors, not only who He is, but that "His Kingdom is not of this world"!

It is apparent that as Mark records the "elevated" teaching of Jesus, the words are not only for the Twelve, but for generations of believers who will hear and read of the signs and wonders that will precede His coming again. In a parable, there is reference to a far journey the Master takes, only after giving authority to trusted servants and specific duties to every worker. The command for the porter to keep watch is emphatic. We all are ordered to watch! Pray to be ready.

HAVE DOUBTS? ... THAT'S OKAY!

Pastor David Jeremiah in a recent article, states that doubting can very well be a positive exercise, keeping in mind that doubt is not unbelief. This word is too often misused; questioning, confirming, suspecting are all better applications. *Doubting Thomas* got a bad rap says the pastor. Unlike the other disciples who were present with Jesus following His resurrection, Thomas felt need to question his peers, thus his "Unless I see..." commentary. Pastor Jeremiah makes a salient point that well may apply to many spiritually: "He (Thomas) didn't say I don't believe...he simply said, I haven't seen evidence of His resurrection." Conversely, Jesus spoke a related crucial truth once Thomas had made his convincing touch. "Blessed are they who did not see, and yet believed." Prior to that, the humbled disciple confessed..."My Lord and my God"!

DOUBT = DISCOVERY

Two decades after the Lord's ascension to glory, Thomas who was known to brother disciples and the early church as a "courageous, deliberate thinker, and a detailed person", was ordered to Persia for his mission. He arrived on India's SW coast in 52 AD. Having established seven churches there, the persistent apostle traveled the lower country (now Chennai), presenting the Gospel to so many, that millions today are known as Saint Thomas Christians. He ministered until his martyrdom twenty years later. Landmarks, church branches, even a postal stamp commemorate his efforts to present Jesus Christ to the masses, not a record you would normally identify with a doubter.




